Humanists generally believe moral decisions should be based on empathy, compassion and logic for a situation rather than following a set of rules from scripture or religious authority.

Wrongdoing

- Actions that cause harm are often considered wrong and immoral. This can include actions like littering, violence, theft or lying.
- Many religious people use the term sin to refer to wrongdoing which is believed to break the rules given by God.



- ▶ In the **Muslim worldview**, a wrongdoing or sin is believed to cause harm to the soul and create a distance from Allah (God).
- Many Muslims strive to 'cleanse' their souls from wrongdoing through sincere repentance, seeking forgiveness and intending not to repeat the sin.
- During Ramadan, many Muslims fast from dawn to dusk, abstaining from food, drink and other physical needs. One of the central themes of Ramadan is seeking forgiveness for past sins.

R&W - What happens if we do wrong?





- In the Jewish worldview, the soul is considered pure at birth. However, human beings are imperfect and can commit sins in their lifetime, which can affect the soul.
- Also known as the 'Day of Repentance', on Yom Kippur, many Jewish people fast and pray, seeking forgiveness from God for their past year's sins.



- ▶ In the **Christian worldview**, sin is viewed as an act that separates the soul from God.
- Many Catholics seek God's forgiveness through Confession, a process involving admitting wrongdoing to a priest in a Confessional box in the Church, feeling guilty (repentant), and being given action or prayer by the priest to show a commitment to living morally.



- In the Christian worldview, **baptism** is one way the soul can be 'cleansed.'
- Baptism represents the washing away of sin and the start of a new life, believing and following the teachings of Jesus.
- Some babies are baptised (by sprinkling water on the head) to admit them into Christian religion and purify their souls of 'Original sin', which is a sin believed to be found in all humans at birth as a result of Adam and Eve's disobedience to God.
- Some Christians practise believer's baptism (complete immersion into the water) for adults who have made a personal decision to live a life committed to Christian beliefs.



- The Hindu worldview includes the belief in one divine universal spirit called Brahman, which can take the form of many gods and goddesses.
- Many Hindus believe in karma, meaning their actions affect their future lives.
- Hindus generally believe that the soul is born into a new body after death. This cycle continues until the soul is reunited with Brahman.
